Brief Detailed description of how the money will be specifically utilized for Exeter residents: The administrative cost allowances in many of our Federal and State funded programs are insufficient to support the staff and facility costs necessary to maintain the full range of programs we provide. The strength of RCA's approach is that we address the wider needs that clients present when applying for these narrowly defined, highly regulated and means tested Federal and State programs. Few who come to us for help have only one problem; no one is poor because of just one reason. Exeter funds help ensure that all RCA programs, as enumerated on the attached narrative, will remain available to all Exeter residents in need. Note: During the COVID-19 pandemic RCA is proud to have been available to all clients, existing and new, without missing a day of operation. The Governor's Housing Relief Program is currently being administrated through RCA



Southern New Hampshire Services (SNHS) operates in Rockingham County as Rockingham Community Action (RCA), a private, non-profit corporation serving low-income individuals and families residing in all 37 municipalities of Rockingham County, NH. RCA's mission is accomplished by offering a variety of services to address people's immediate needs, providing the tools and skills to help achieve self-reliance and improve long term quality of life, and working in partnership with the community and other service providers to address the root causes of poverty.

Every year we receive funds from each Rockingham County municipality for the general operating expenses of RCA's five (5) Resource Centers. Our Resource Centers provide services ranging from meeting immediate crisis needs (often helping municipalities with local welfare requests) to providing the tools and resources to bring individuals and families one step further along in their pursuit of self-sufficiency. We identify the full range of services available to clients, create financial assistance plans to address clients' needs, advocate to ensure that assistance from other providers is accessed, and provide direct services. Direct services to low-income households include:

- 1) **Fuel/Electric Assistance Programs:** RCA staff screen and enroll households in federal LIHEAP (Low Income Heating & Energy Assistance Program, aka 'fuel assistance' and state Electric Assistance programs.
- 2) **Crisis Services:** RCA staff provide emergency grants, often working in cooperation with municipal welfare, for households facing eviction, foreclosure and/or utility terminations.
- 3) **Food Pantries:** RCA staff assist households who are critically low on food with donated and purchased perishable, non-perishable, meat and dairy food items.
- 4) **Financial Capability:** RCA employs dedicated staff who are responsible for holding free tax preparation geared at the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) eligible tax payer, providing one on one financial coaching, credit repair, financial crisis interventions, workshops and access to partner financial services. Staff also works at filling the void in financial stability programming when a need presents itself ie working with town assistance offices to help fill out Property Tax Relief forms.
- 5) **Homeless Housing Access Revolving Loan Fund:** RCA staff screen and enroll homeless applicants in this program providing an interest free loan toward a security deposit and/or first month's rent.
- 6) **Homeless Outreach/Intervention Program:** RCA staff assist homeless individuals and families with identifying shelter needs, arranging emergency transportation to shelters, and arranging alternative shelter.
- 7) **Housing Security Guarantee Program:** RCA staff screen and enroll low-income households in this program providing no-interest loan guarantees toward security deposits
- 8) **Personal Emergency Response System:** RCA staff provide access to affordable emergency response systems for aged and/or disabled individuals in order to ensure their safety and maintain their independence and quality of life.
- 9) **NH DP-8 Low & Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief applications:** RCA staff contact eligible County resident homeowners and assist in the completion of this application to receive a State property tax refund check.


In order to provide the wide range of services that we do, RCA depends upon a number of funding sources. Federal LIHEAP (Low Income Heating & Energy Assistance Program) and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) funds are used to provide annual fuel assistance grants and emergency assistance services. State Grant in Aid funds through the NH DHHS Bureau of Housing Supports are used for homeless services. RCA also solicits and receives grants from a variety to sources (among these the United Way, small foundations and scores of unsolicited private donations) for programming not attached to Federal funding, such as financial capability and food pantry programs. While providing significant direct assistance grants, the administrative allowances included in the Federal and state funded programs are insufficient to support the staff and facility costs necessary to administer the programs. The strength of RCA's presence in the local communities is that we address the wider needs that clients present when coming in to apply for these narrowly-defined, highly-regulated and means-tested Federal and State programs. RCA takes a generalist approach to addressing poverty issues in Rockingham County because nobody who comes to us for help has only one problem; no one is poor because of just one reason. The reality of this approach is, however, that few large funding sources pay for the face to face interactions and relationship building it takes to fully and adequately address the multitude of problems being experienced by many of our clients. We count on funding from all municipalities in Rockingham County to support us in taking the time to investigate and address the root issues which have caused the presenting crisis.

Each year RCA generates a Program Statistical Report (PSR) which lists all the services we provide to County residents, also breaking out these numbers by municipality, and the total value of each service. Over time the PSR has been the most effective way to demonstrate to our funders and the public the range of service we provide. The PSR for the period of October 1 2018 through September 30 2019 is included with this Funding Request. And of course, we are always happy to provide more specific information about any program referenced on the PSR.

RCA is proud of our long standing relationship with Rockingham County's municipal welfare administrators, and our positive impact on municipal general assistance budgets through the services and supports we provide. NH RSA 165 requires each municipality in the State is to 'relieve and maintain' any individual who is found to be 'poor and unable to support himself (sic)'. This is a very broad mandate, and often can lead to a long term period of expense for NH municipalities as they provide for indigent residents' needs. One way municipalities can control these costs is by adopting clearly defined Welfare Guidelines establishing limits on assistance through legally enforceable requirements place upon Welfare recipients. The availability of the supports and services offered by RCA helps municipalities maintain the integrity of their Guidelines and reduce general assistance costs as they partner with us in meeting the immediate financial needs of their indigent residents. Classic examples of these situations would be a household facing termination of electric service and owing several months of electric bills, or a household which has run dry of fuel oil but cannot get a delivery until past bills are paid.

A message from our Executive Director

Donnalee Lozeau

The past year has opened many doors to economic stability for those we serve. Simultaneously, new doors have opened to transform critical partnerships in these efforts. The conversations, understanding and impact has never been stronger.

For the first time in a long time, we see the "stars aligning" to expand the method our Head Start programs have always taken, the "whole family approach" also known as 2Gen. Research demonstrates that it is a proven model to help families achieve their goals and feel empowered to drive their own futures. These stars are aligning locally, statewide, nationally, and of course within our agency and our sister agencies.

Locally, in June of 2019 Amoskeag Health (formerly known as Manchester Community Health Center) issued LAUNCH, Manchester's five-year strategic plan for young children and families. This report was a culmination of a community collaboration from 2012 through 2019. This work identifies challenges and opportunities. It is a living road map to best practice, evidence-based solutions promoting the wellness of young children ages birth to 8 with a long-term goal of ensuring all children enter school ready to learn and able to succeed.

NH Department of Health and Human Services is bringing the whole family lens to their work. They are transforming and rebalancing their divisions to reflect the value of strengthening the whole family. They are implementing integration teams across the agency and encouraging partnerships internally and externally to have a shared responsibility for outcomes. They created the Division of Economic and Housing Stability which puts the social determinates of health in the forefront of their work. They are changing the conversation not only at Health and Human Services, but across state departments.

The NH Charitable Foundation's on-going initiative, New Hampshire Tomorrow Investing in our Kids is making great strides in their 4 proven focus areas: early childhood development; family and youth support; substance use prevention, treatment and recovery; and education in career pathways. Their research, funding, and community discussion groups bring cross sector partners working in those fields together. Their dollars leverage other resources and provide needed ingredients for success.

The Administration for Children and Families, the National Council of State Legislators, and each state are partnering with an initiative for jobs, "Helping Parents Work and Children Thrive." We are on board and helping to bring the parent voice to the table. Best of all, there is movement in the right direction. The level of understanding from our policy makers, to our employers is nothing short of remarkable. In 2019 House Bill 4 created a working group on the "cliff effect" which will report out this coming year providing the tools to further this work.

We are fortunate that we have been at the table in all of the aforementioned initiatives. The roadmap to expanding

agency-wide to the Whole Family Approach is well underway. In 2019 we invited a group of those we serve to discuss their experiences including what has or has not worked for them. In addition, we convened staff from all five Community Action Partnerships that work within our workforce programs and childcare staff to help them to build stronger connections with each other and inform their efforts in a more meaningful way.

We know that:


1. Without affordable housing nothing else can matter.
2. Without quality affordable childcare jobs can't be filled.
3. Without access to quality education and/or training reaching a living wage won't happen.
4. Without the right bridges to economic mobility nothing changes.

As we move into 2020, we look forward to breaking down not only program silos, but funding silos. The benefit of working across disciplines, and providing resources in a more comprehensive way will have a positive, measurable outcome for New Hampshire and our families.

As always, our success is due to our staff, our board of directors, and our community partners and leaders who support our efforts to help those we serve reach their full potential, thank you!

We are grateful to find so many open doors. Let's endeavor to move forward through them arm and arm with "2020" vision!





SNHS is committed to creating opportunities throughout Hillsborough and Rockingham Counties for individuals and families to receive free tax preparation through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA). The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a refundable tax credit that has lifted millions of poor working families out of poverty and SNHS. Research suggests the EITC improves health, with the most robust results for single mothers and children.

Have Taxes? Get VITA!

VITA, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program, is provided by SNHS to help individual and families with their tax preparations. For low- to middle-income taxpayers who make \$54,000 or less annually, who have a disability preventing them from filing, or for whom English is a second language, VITA is a very valuable free service.

If you feel like you could use some help preparing and filing your taxes, a call to VITA will help you navigate the process and ensure you receive your maximum refund and credit!

What is the EITC?

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a tax credit for low- and moderate-income wage earners. The team at the VITA program can help you determine if you qualify and claim it.

Worried you should have been claiming the EITC for a few years now? No problem. The IRS allows taxpayers to go back three years (2016, 2017 & 2018 tax years) and claim it. Call VITA to find out more today!

Tax Facts:

- Low- and moderate-wage earners may qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC).
- For the 2019 tax year, the earned income credit ranges from \$529 to \$6,557 depending on your filing status and how many children you have.
- You don't have to have a child in order to claim the earned income credit.
- The earned income tax credit doesn't just cut the amount of tax you owe — the EITC could also provide you a refund, and in some cases a refund that's more than what you actually paid in taxes.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) provides emergency food assistance at no cost to low-income families. SNHS helps distribute this food to programs that can get it into the community, such as food pantries, local soup kitchens and other charitable organizations.

The Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC) provides nutritious foods, education, referrals and breastfeeding support to income eligible pregnant and post-partum women, infants and children under the age of 5. All of our nutritionists have at least a four year Bachelors in Science and Nutrition to support our participants.

Food Pantries

SNHS also has multiple food pantry sites that are located in Rockingham County. These food pantries are open at no cost to community members that need additional food resources.

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

provides food resources to income eligible adults over the age of 60. SNHS has CSFP sites all throughout both Rockingham and Hillsborough counties.

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) sponsorship is available to Family Child Care Homes, Child Care Centers, and Adult Care Centers to receive reimbursement for meals that they serve to the children and adults in their care.

Green Thumbs Wanted

The Community Gardens Program is an initiative of SNHS and Hillsborough County to provide garden plots to interested individuals on county land located in Goffstown. Income eligible Hillsborough County residents are given priority to available plots and are provided a plot free of charge. A nominal donation is requested of community members exceeding the income threshold.

Each community gardener accepted into the program receives a 25'x25' rototilled garden plot. Water, seeds, tools, and other materials needed to maintain the plot must be supplied by the gardener. Benefits of the program include greater access to fresh local produce, lower grocery bills, and an increased sense of community. Deadline to apply for your plot is April 17.


Opening Doors to Supportive & Welcoming Elderly Housing.







Academic Skills/High School Equivalency and ESL classes for Adults - Portsmouth

The Portsmouth Adult Education Program provides quality adult basic education services in a classroom learning environment. These FREE Day and evening classes are available for adults in need of improving:

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program Action Month

Cold weather months are on the way!

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), also known as the Fuel Assistance Program (FAP), assists low income households that pay a high proportion of income for home energy. The program is funded by grants from the federal government, and makes payments directly to local utilities. To be eligible, an individual's income level must not be more than 150% of the federal poverty level. The payment amount is determined according to the size and type of the home, as well as type of fuel.


Weatherization Success Story

A call came in from a father of four who was struggling to make ends meet after returning home from Afghanistan. He was experiencing unexpected hardships that left him alone to raise and provide for his children. An Energy Audit proved that there were many ways that we could make the home more energy efficient but the savings in energy costs still didn't reflect in enough cost savings to give financial respite. A call by our staff to the utility company resulted in an approval to install a new Energy Star LP Gas high efficiency heating system. Soon there was a new boiler, baseboard distribution, and indirect fired water heater with insulation measures installed in the home to further improve the home's efficiency.

The client was overwhelmed by all the work that was done and the treatment his family received throughout the process. He now has peace of mind knowing that he can keep his family warm throughout the upcoming heating seasons and as his heating cost will be much more affordable.

Success Stories

A single Dad, originally from Africa, had a school aged child at home as well as a few teenagers. He was not at all comfortable on the computer and had never completed a resume or any job search tool. However, he was very eager to learn and had his hopes set on becoming a bus driver. He was very reliable, and even though he had no transportation, he completed his vocational assessments and job search tools. I referred him to the On the Job Training (OJT) program. He was approved and was able to secure a job as a bus driver for Easter Seals. His wonderful and caring personality was a great fit for this position and he continues to thrive. He still is employed and whenever I see him he lets me know how much he appreciates the help he had and how much he loves his job.



A single mother of four with children ranging from 9 to 19 in age (one with disabilities and many needs) was referred to us through NH Works. She had been out of work for years due to leg issues and managing her personal life. She had a wonderful work past but, her large gap in her employment history was a major issue for her in finding a new job. She did not know how to best frame the reasons behind the gap in employment and felt like she needed to brush up on communication and customer service skills. When she came here her computer skills were very limited and she was uncertain of what she wanted to do with her life. On top of it all, her physical limitations from her leg injury was a big problem for her since she was still on crutches. Through the course of her training she gained confidence, enhanced her computer skills, learned to better manage her schedule and found time for physical therapy for her leg. Once she completed the program she quickly obtained a manager's job at Subway. She has kept in contact, and is now managing two stores in Manchester, received a raise and hopes to move up in the company soon!


Head Start:

November Homelessness Prevention

SNHS Helps Homeless Men & Women to Open Their Own Doors!

Safe and Supportive Housing

SNHS plays a significant role in the lives of men and women living in Manchester and Nashua who are experiencing issues related to homelessness. On-site staff help to connect residents with the supportive programming that can enable them to move toward increased quality of life.

Robinson House (24 units-Manchester) and Mary's House (40 units-Nashua) consist of rehabilitated Section 8 rent assisted apartments for homeless individuals who need safe and affordable housing to reach their personal goals.

The Homeless Housing and Access Revolving Loan Fund

Provides guarantees of rental security deposits and/or first month's rent to eligible persons.

The Housing Security Guarantee Program

Assists low income individuals and families in obtaining housing by issuing certificates to landlords that guarantee security deposits.

SNHS can also provide information and referral services for individuals or families in need of emergency shelter.
