


Parks & Recreation Director 1971 - 2003

Dedicated, reputable, progressive, friendly, stern, opinionated, compassionate, professional, jokester, fun-loving... These are some of the many adjectives that describe Doug Dicey.

Doug has been the Parks & Recreation Director for the Town of Exeter for the past thirty-one years. When he arrived in 1971 from Franklin, his budget of \$39,000 had to cover three full-time employees and the cost of all department programs. About sixty children participated in town programs at the time. Since then, his budget has risen to \$740,000 to cover six full-time and part-time staff and more than 300 volunteers; about half that figure comes in as revenue.

Doug dedicated his 31 years here to making our Department one of the most respected and event-filled departments in the State. His hundreds of successful programs over the years meant long hours and, based on his longevity, reflect his love for the Town. The Department meant everything to him and, though he longed for retirement, it was still tough to let go.

This edition of the Town Report is co-dedicated to Doug Dicey, for all he has given to the Town of Exeter. We thank you! You will be missed! Best wishes for an enjoyable and long retirement.

Exeter Notables

Ambrose Swasey, who gave us our Bandstand and Parkway, also assisted in the invention of the reflector telescopes at Mount Palomar (California) and McDonald Observatory (Texas). Sculptor Daniel Chester French (Minuteman statue at Lexington, Mass and the statue of Lincoln at the Lincoln Memorial, Washington, DC.), locally designed the War Memorial at Gale Park (represents "Mother Town" and "Soldier Son").

Points of Interest

Swasey Pavilion (The Bandstand), built in 1916, as a gift from Ambrose Swasey, conceived by architect Henry Bacon (designer of the Lincoln Memorial), and Daniel Chester French, also an Exeter native & sculptor of Concord Minuteman and seated Lincoln in Washington DC. Band concerts by one of the oldest continuous Brass Bands take place during summer. Exeter's Historical Society, 47 Front St, was designed as Exeter's Public Library and Civil War Memorial. (Open to the Public.) American Independence Museum (the State's Revolutionary Capital) features the Ladd-Gilman House and the Folsom Tavern. (Open to the Public). The Powder House, seen across the Squamscott River from the Swasey Parkway, stored some of the powder captured at Fort William & Mary in 1774 (one of first hostile acts of Revolution). Unique, as it's square -(most powder houses were round) & the brick goes all the way up the roof. Gilman Garrison, 12 Water St, formerly licensed as a tavern by John Gilman, Jr. (Open to the Public).

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING PROCESS FOR 2002

(Abbreviated - refer to 2001 Town Report & Town Clerk's & Town Clerk's office for article description & details)

Deliberative Session:

Saturday, February 9, 2002, 9:00AM (Exeter Town Hall)

Moderator Charles Tucker, having called the meeting to order at 9:00AM, explained Articles 1 through 12 did not require any action at this meeting. Article 1 chooses Town Officers for the ensuing year; Articles 2 through 12 are Zoning Articles heard at Planning Board public hearings prior to this meeting and will appear on the ballot as written. This meeting has no power to amend these Articles.

Articles 14- 19:

No action – will appear on ballot as presented.

Article 20: Amended by adding: "and to authorize the transfer of \$150,000 from the December, 2001 fund balance for this purpose?" So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Articles 21-25:

No action – will appear on ballot as presented.

Article 26: Amended to change the amount needed to supplement the funds previously raised to "\$42,278". So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Articles 27-38:

No action – will appear on ballot as presented.

Article 39: Amended to read "Shall the Town raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$0, for support of the Exeter Taxpayers Association, a non-profit agency carrying out analysis and education activities relevant to the raising and spending of local tax monies?" So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Articles 40-41:

No action - will appear on ballot as presented.

Article 42: Amended to read "To see if the Town will vote, through its Board of Selectmen, to consider whether a non-governmental and non-town agency serves the Town's residents before the Town funds any such agencies using property tax dollars." So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Article 43: Amended to read "To see if the Town will recommend to the Board of Selectmen to appropriate fifty percent (50%), not to exceed \$1,250,000 of the Town's Unreserved Fund Balance as of 12/31/2002 for property tax relief by applying said funds to the property tax burden in the 2003 fiscal year." So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Articles 44-45: No action – will appear on ballot as presented.

Article 46: Amended to read "To see if the Town will recommend the selectmen publish in the Annual Report, beginning with the year ending December 31, 2002, all salaries and benefits for hourly and annually paid employees, officials and other staff members." So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Article 47: Amended to read "To see if the Town will vote to recommend that the Selectmen publish in the Annual Report, beginning with the year ending December 31, 2002, a listing by name of all suppliers and contractors who have supplied goods and/or other services to the town, including the total amount paid to each in the report year." So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

Article 48: Amended to read "To see if the Town will vote to recommend that the Selectmen publish in the Annual Report, beginning with the year ending December 31, 2002, an inventory within the Property Schedule that lists all town owned or leased vehicles and other equipment, including their description, assigned department, age, town identification number and dollar value?" So voted. Will appear on the ballot as amended.

REVOLUTIONARY CAPITAL

One of many Historical signs one may view around Town.

Founded by Rev. John Wheelwright in 1638, Exeter was one of the four original towns in the colony. Following New Hampshire's provisional declaration of independence on January 5, 1776, it served as the capital of the new state during the period of the American Revolution.

September Primary 2002

[Minutes, in part, by the Town Clerk. Full copy on file at office.]

The NH State Primary was held in the Exeter Town Hall on Tuesday, September 10, 2002, called to order by Moderator Charles Tucker at 7:00AM. He read the State Warrant and announced the voting times would be from 7AM through 8PM. Absentee Ballots would be processed 2PM, pursuant to NH RSA 659:49. During the day, fans were brought into the Hall due to the hot, humid weather and the Fire Department installed a temporary exhaust fan to blow the heat from the Hall.

There were three separate ballots for this Primary: the regular ballot for Governor, US Senator, Rep. in Congress and County Officers; a paper ballot for State Senator and a printed ballot for State Representatives. The polls closed at 8:00PM and electronic voting machines were run for the tabulations and the counting of the write-in ballots and State Senate ballots began.

At 9:30PM, Moderator Tucker announced the results of voting on the regular ballot (individual results available at the Town Clerk's office). At 10:45PM, Moderator Tucker announced the results of the votes for State Senator and State Representatives (individual results available at the Town Clerk's office). There were a total of 2,963 votes cast – 2,742 cast in person and 221 absentee votes. There were 1963 Republican ballots cast and 1000 Democratic ballots cast. There were 7,716 registered voters at opening of the polls, with 125 new registered voters during the day, for a total of 7,841 registered voters on the checklist at the close of the polls.

Exeter had a 38% voting participation for this State Primary.

MINUTES OF GENERAL ELECTION

(in part - full copy at Town Clerk's office)

The NH General Election was held in the Exeter Town Hall on Tuesday, November 5, 2002. Moderator Charles Tucker called the meeting to order at 7:00AM. He read the warrant (above) and announced that Absentee Ballots would be processed beginning at 1:00PM, pursuant to NH RSA 659:49. All Ballot Clerks and Election Inspectors had been instructed of voting details; the new Clerks were sworn in by Moderator Tucker. He declared the polls open for voting.

At 1:30PM, Moderator Tucker and Town Clerk Linda Hartson began processing the absentee ballots. There were 496 absentee ballots returned, but 3 ballots had unsigned Affidavits and these were set aside.

At 8:00PM, Moderator Tucker asked if all had voted who wanted to and were eligible to vote in Exeter. There being no additional voters to cast ballots, the Moderator declared the polls closed. The electronic voting machines were run for the tabulations and the counting of the write-in ballots began.

Moderator Tucker announced the results of voting for the Town of Exeter at 9:20PM. There were a total of 5,684 votes cast -5,191 votes cast in person and 494 absentee votes. There were 7,842 registered voters at the opening of the pools, 408 new registered voters during the day, making a total of 8,250 registered voters on the checklist at the close of the polls. There were several write-in votes for candidates in many races and all are listed on the tally sheets. Exeter had a 68.9% voting participation for this General Election.

Board of Selectmen

If you're reading this report, then you're interested in the life of your town, and that's a good thing. Now, share it with your friends, your neighbors, your children, anybody and everybody who lives, works, plays, or goes to school in Exeter. As you page through this report, you'll notice just how many volunteers it takes to keep this town the vibrant, thriving jewel it is. All those people on the various boards and commissions have the gratitude of the town for their service, because if we had to pay them, we'd never get the budget passed! In all seriousness, the life of a town is dependent on the involvement and passion of those who are invested in its future. I don't care if you're old, young, how you feel about growth or taxes, or if you can give ten minutes a year to get out and vote or two hours a week to serve on a committee. The town is better for your participation.

Looking back at the year that was 2002 in Exeter, a number of things stand out. The Great Bridge reconstruction was completed, on time and on budget, and the result is impressive. People continue to board the Downeaster in Exeter, greatly surpassing all projections. The Board of Selectmen was finally able to finish work on the new ambulance fund, and we continue to put our heads together with the Fire Department and the Budget Committee on the issue of a fire substation in Exeter. The new pay plan, so long in coming, is now largely in place. TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

In looking over my reports from past years it occurs to me that I've been reporting things backwards. I've been reporting on the highlight of the year and then, at the end thanked those folks that made the year a success. Seems to me that the thanking should come first and not last. So, thanks to the Board of Selectmen for making this job fun for so many years, thanks to my department heads for making the Town work, and thanks to all of our employees for making the Manager look good! And thanks to all of the residents who for so long have supported and been a part of all of our efforts to keep Exeter the great place that we call home.

Lots of construction characterized 2002. The Public Works Complex grew with the addition of a new office building and a new salt shed. Parks and Recreation saw the replacement of its handicap access with a new ramp and landscaping. The Bandstand received much needed masonry repair and the finishing touches were put on the Town Hall exterior. And, of course, no discussion of construction would be complete without mention of the Great Bridge Project. Opened 3 days early, the entire project covered a 9-month period, with the new traffic pattern necessitated by the construction meeting unanticipated support. A great deal was learned about downtown traffic flow during the construction period and, as a consequence, some changes were implemented.

As for major equipment purchases in 2002, the new Fire Department Pumper arrived just in time to show it off at the Christmas Parade.

Other 2002 Town initiatives to be highlighted include the completion of 3 chapters of the Town's Master Plan, new 3-year agreements with 2 of the Town 3 unions, a new retirement program for non-uniform Town employees. Also undertaken during the year was a detailed look at a new Water Treatment Plant, a comprehensive downtown parking study prepared under the leadership of the Exeter Area Chamber of Commerce, implementation of a study on ambulance rates, a look at locations for a second fire station, and a report on Town communication needs in anticipation of purchase of a new telephone system.

On the personnel side, the town was saddened by the death of John Doyle, an 11-year employee of the Public Works Department's Highway Division. The year also saw Highway Superintendent Bob Tucker and Parks & Recreation Director Doug Dicey both put in their paperwork to retire after over 40 and 31 years of service to the Town respectively, Jan French Dicey resigned after 23 years of service, Amy Goodrich, Deputy Tax Collector, resigned after 9 years with Town and Karen Springer, Town Prosecutor, also resigned after 9 years with the Town.

Busy year, like most years, and like most years lots of progress to be proud of.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

This past year the Assessing Office has been busy keeping up with Exeter's housing growth: several new subdivisions, new single family houses, commercial growth and hundreds of building permits. Also updating the 2002 Elderly Exemption standards, as well as processing hundreds of deed transfers made for an active year.

For the tenth year in a row, the 2002 computerized reassessment was successfully completed with land values and building values increasing due to appreciation of market values in the sale of real estate in Exeter. This yearly computerized value update will bring confidence to property owners that they are paying their fair share of the tax burden, and that there is a parity within Exeter's tax structure. Computerized updating has resulted in a more stable relationship between real estate market sales and tax assessment values.

Again this year, total property value has risen to over one billion dollars. Exeter's tax base in 2002 increased approximately \$152 million to \$1,161,004,106. This value increase is attributed to \$23 million in new building construction and approximately \$129 million in market appreciation in all styles and types of property, namely single family homes, mobile homes, condominiums, commercial, industrial and land categories.

Our developing GIS computer mapping program has been intergraded with the assessment software data, giving property owners valuable geographic information linked with property attributes. This information is then updated on a monthly basis. The paper tax maps are also updated annually to reflect accurate property lines, subdivision, ownership and current assessment values. At the office counter, we now have a public computer terminal giving easy access to all assessment records and property data in town.

Information on tax relief in the form of the Veteran's Credit and the Elderly Exemption, with a deadline of March 1st following the notice of the tax bill is available along with Current Land Use and Intent to Cut Timber applications and procedures in the Assessor's Office.

The Assessor and office staff are always available to address any questions or concerns regarding your property and encourage your participation in the education and understanding of the assessment process.

As another year passes, I would like to thank my fellow office employees and property owners for their support and understanding in running a successful assessment program. I am looking forward to a busy and productive year in 2003.

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

As I prepare to write my 15th Town Clerk's report, I think about the diversity of services provided by our offices each week. I think most of the Town employees would agree that every week brings a different challenge. We see new faces at our windows as the community continues to expand, and we greet residents whom we see year after year. Exeter is a wonderful Town to live in; a community with many things to be involved in – a community we call HOME.

This year the Town Clerk's staff processed over 17,000 motor vehicle registrations; issued over 7,200 certified copies of birth, marriage and death certificates; issued over 120 marriage licenses; licensed over 1,800 dogs and collected revenues of approximately \$2.1 million. We had the pleasure of meeting many proud new parents and their infants; watching excited couples file for marriage while their relatives photograph the event; assisting first time motor vehicle owners; welcoming new residents to our community. My co-workers, Deputy Town Clerk Lisa Buxton, Eve Quinn and Debra Unger, Assistant Clerks, continue to provide our citizens with the quality of service that makes this office operate in an efficient and successful manner. I thank them for their support, assistance and patience – for being team-workers.

This year we had three elections – the March Town Elections for Town Officials, warrant articles and the budget, with 30% Voter participation; the September Primary for State, County, and Federal Officials, with 38% Voter participation; and the November General Election, with 70% Voter participation. Our Voter Checklist Supervisors Alice Dorman, Margaret "Peg" Duhamel and Winifred "Fritzi" Bernard spent many hours correcting and updating the checklist for each of these elections. We thank them for their efforts in helping to maintain the integrity of our voters. We also thank the Exeter residents who give of their time on election days. We work long, hard hours to make sure the election process goes as smoothly and efficiently as possible.

I thank the members of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager, Department Managers and all Town employees for their continued support and assistance during this past year. My thanks to the residents of this community for your support, understanding and patience. It is always rewarding to know we have been able to help the people who call or come in to the office with questions ranging from A to Z.

The Exeter Police Department

The Exeter Police Department is continually looking for ways to meet the demands placed on it by the increasing population and growth of the Town. The Department is tasked with a growing list of public safety responsibilities which include combating serious crimes, homeland security concerns, traffic congestion and enforcement, additional calls for service and expanded patrol areas. The make-up of the Department has changed little over the last 20 years while the responsibilities continue to grow. Only with the help of grant money, have we been able to add key personnel. We are determined to professionally and competently perform our duties, while trying to balance the financial impact to the citizens.

The Department employees had set ambitious goals for the year 2002. These included: continuing to pursue National Accreditation, aggressively attacking the drug problem by joining the N.H. Drug Task Force, reducing speeding complaints and completing our radio upgrades. Other goals included: training in the area of terrorism and weapons of mass destruction, applying for federal grants and upgrading our cruiser laptop and dispatch communications. I am happy to report that the majority of these goals have been accomplished, while some will continue to be on going.

The Department applied for and received grants for speed reduction equipment (radar trailer) for \$6,000.00. This equipment has given us another weapon to combat speeding drivers. It has been used in numerous locations across Town. It has enabled the Department to focus on certain areas and times when speeding is prevalent. Through a Federal grant of \$48,000.00 our cruisers and dispatch center have seen a significant upgrade in communication equipment. Continuing to upgrade our communications system is vital for both the Police and Fire Departments. Through a state grant of \$30,000.00, we have been able to assign a full time officer to the NH Attorney General's Drug Task Force. This position will greatly enhance our ability to investigate and prosecute illegal drug sales and use. Our very successful School Resource Officer Program is on its last year with federal assistance in the amount of \$20,000.00. School and police officials fully support the continuation of this program.


The Department has identified goals for 2003, which include continued technology updates to the base station radios for police and fire departments, continuing in the quest to reach level 4 Accreditation and continued training for the officers - especially in the area of weapons of mass destruction.

I am especially appreciative to both the sworn officers and the civilian employees of this Police Department. All are truly committed to providing the public with exceptional service. Daily I am reminded that without them, we could not perform as skillfully, efficiently and professionally as we do. These men and women are an immense source of pride for me. I would also like to thank the Department's two dedicated RSVP volunteers, who routinely give up their own time to assist the Department.

Special thanks goes to the Board of Selectman, Town Manager George Olson and the other Department heads, whom I have worked with in the past year, for their advice and support.



DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

I am pleased to submit my 18th annual report to the citizens of Exeter. Once again we have experienced a busy and productive year. Major projects completed include rebuilding of the Great Bridge and the river wall alongside Founders' Park, preliminary design work for the proposed new Water Treatment Plant, extension and submersion of the Wastewater Treatment Plant discharge pipe, construction of the Hampton Road bike path, and the replacement of the Recreation Department handicap ramp and associated landscaping improvements. Another notable accomplishment is the development of our department Vision Statement and the setting of three values by our employees and staff. "Preserving, Enhancing Community and Environment" is our vision statement and Teamwork, Safety and Integrity are core values we have committed to work by. This sets a framework and guiding principals for all employees to better serve the community and each other.

The Engineering Team was very busy overseeing and managing the Great Bridge and Founders' Park river wall project. In addition, the team managed the Hampton Road bike path project and High Street area sewer replacement projects, managed "Value Engineering" for the Water Treatment plant project, completed initial work on requirements of the Federal Storm Water Phase II program, and implemented an Infrastructure Management program. They also worked closely with the Planning Department reviewing proposed development and observing construction for compliance with plans and standards.

The Highway Team had a slight reprieve from snow fighting operations as we experienced a relatively mild winter. Completed projects include assisting the Parks Department in rebuilding a number of old cemetery stone walls, installation of granite curbing on Court Street, replacement of the decking on the Cross Road bridge, and Town Hall site improvements. A new salt storage building was built replacing the old dilapidated and undersized shed that additionally meets new environmental regulations.

The Maintenance Team was busy maintaining town facilities, vehicles and equipment. Maintenance projects completed include Town Hall men's room entryway improvements and associated site work, overhaul of the asphalt roller and brush chipper, state motor vehicle inspections of all town vehicles, fabrication of computer counter tops for the Public Safety dispatch office, installation of carbon monoxide ventilating equipment for the Public Works garages, replacement of the Fire Station air horn tank and installation of all interior fire doors at the Recreation Department. In addition, the Maintenance Superintendent managed the Public Works new office building and salt shed replacement projects, the EPA environmental compliance improvements, the Recreation and Parks Department handicap ramp reconstruction with site improvements, the Town Hall elevator project and Bandstand masonry repairs.


The Water and Sewer Team has accomplished a number of projects that include renovating the old water plant office, renovating and upgrading the Webster Avenue sewer pump station, installing a new high lift pump at the Water Treatment Plant, monitoring water and sewer line replacements at the Great Bridge project, implementing a computerized water meter maintenance and valve exercising program and overseeing the cleaning of the Fuller Lane and Epping Road water storage tanks. In addition, the Water Treatment Plant Operators assisted the Water and Sewer Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent with the preliminary design work and Treatment Plant processes selection for the proposed new water treatment plant.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, Water & Sewer Advisory Committee, fellow Department Heads and Public Works team players for their assistance, guidance, and contributions throughout the year.

Exeter Fire Department

A Tradition of Service

As 2003 begins, the Exeter Fire Department celebrates it 40th year of providing Emergency Medical Services to the citizens of Exeter. The ambulance service has seen many changes from the days of Cadillac Hearses to the Heavy Duty Rescues we use today. From basic first aid to paramedics this service has grown to over 1300 calls annually.

This year the voters will be asked to support two major items, the first is the Ambulance Charter. The charter will allow the fire department to offset its operating costs and lower the ambulance budget by \$150,000.00. I would ask you to please support this change.

The second is the design of a west side fire station, to be built on Epping Rd in 2004. This project is needed to improve the coverage for both the fire department and the ambulance and is related to the growth, both residential and commercial.

Currently the fire department strives to meet a 4 minute response to your emergency call. After 4 minutes, irreversible damage can occur to someone that has been without oxygen. and in 4 minutes a flashover can occur in your home if a fire starts. Today we cover 51% of the emergency calls in this time frame. A second station will improve this to 74%. Delays can come from many things - trains, weather, road conditions and traffic. We ask for your support and involvement in this project. This is your Fire Department. We would welcome any ideas you may have and would welcome any assistance on this committee.

December will mark the delivery of your newest fire engine, Engine 5. This addition to the fleet replaces a 1979 Mack pumper that will be now placed in reserve. We expect that this engine will serve this community's needs for some time to come. Along with its abilities to provide great fire protection it will also respond to medical emergencies with the same advanced life support equipment found on the ambulances.

I do need to express my thanks to the dedication and professionalism shown by the men and woman of this department, both permanent and call, who respond every day to the needs of this community and work hard to raise the level of service we provide. They continually explore new avenues and projects. Some of the additional services provided are smoke detector inspections and installations with the Meals on Wheels program, reaching over 90 seniors and disabled residents twice a year. The Department is involved with the Seacoast Firefighters Toy Bank, providing Christmas presents to over 130 area children. We are involved in mentoring students from area high schools and are also providing an Explorer Post program for area students with an interest in a career in fire and emergency medical services. We inspect and maintain multi-family inspections in over 300 rental units in Exeter. This insures adequate fire protection and life safety for the thousands of tenants here in Exeter.

During the year department members attended over 7500 hours of training, including training on the Thermal Image Camera, three Emergency Management Drills and Rapid Intervention Training (RIT), a class where firefighters learn the skills needed to rescue downed or trapped firefighters. Two

firefighters attended Fire Officer I, II, a five-week course given at the New Hampshire Fire Academy. Congratulations to Firefighter Paramedic Phil Kendrick and Firefighter Paramedic Andy Head.

Two thousand three will also be a milestone for Deputy Chief Harry Thayer. He has been a member of the Exeter Fire Department for 40 years. Harry has and will continue to be a valued friend and a great fire officer. Harry has helped to shape this department into what it is today, and remains dedicated to the mission.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen for their continued support over the past year and their weeks of hard work on the Ambulance Charter, and Town Manger George Olson for his continued support of the Fire Department's Mission.

Article 1: To choose the following: 1 Selectman for a 3-year term; 3 Library Trustees for 3-year terms; 1 Trustee of the Trust Funds for a 3-year term; 1 Trustee of the Robinson Fund for a 7-year term; 1 Swasey Park Trustee for a 3-year term.

Article 2: Zoning Amendment #1: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 2, Section 2.2 Definitions, Subsection 2.2.2 Accessory Dwelling Unit by adding the phrase "and as delineated in Article 4, Section 4.2 Schedule I: Permitted Uses, Note #2." to the existing definition.

Article 3: Zoning Amendment #2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 3, Section 3.2 Zoning Map to rezone the existing I-Industrial zoning district located to the west of Epping Road and south of the Conner Farm to a RU-Rural zoning district. (See attached map)


Article 4: Zoning Amendment #3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 3, Section 3.2 Zoning Map to rezone the adjoining R-1, Single Family Residential District south of Epping Road to Brentwood Road to a RU-Rural zoning district. See attached map.

Article 5: Zoning Amendment #4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 4.2 Schedule 1 Notes -1. Conversions by deleting the phrase "or as otherwise consistent with the zone" (there are no changes proposed for the existing subsections "a" - "d" of this section).

Article 6: Zoning Amendment #5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 6, Section 6.1 Elderly Congregate Health Care Facilities – by adding a new subsection entitled Article 6.1.4 Density Bonus, as follows: A density bonus of 15% above the number of units permitted in the appropriate zoning district will be granted for developments that will guarantee:

- a. 20% of the total number of units proposed within the development shall be affordable as defined below, see sections (b) and (c).
- b. 15% or more of the units constructed will be sold at initial sale for a price that can be afforded by a household with an income not more than 120% of the median family income for Rockingham County, as published by US Department of Housing and Urban Development;

Article 7: Zoning Amendment #6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 7, Section 7.7. General Regulations Governing Open Space Development, Subsection 7.7.1. Density by deleting subsection B. Density-Bonus in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

Density bonus of 15% above that indicated by the yield plan will be allowed for developments that will guarantee:

- a. 20% of the total number of units proposed within the development (including all units allowed by density bonuses) shall be affordable as defined below, see sections (b) and (c).
- b. 15% or more of the units constructed will be sold at initial sale for a price that can be afforded by a household with an income not more than 120% of the median family income for Rockingham County, as published by US Department of Housing and Urban Development;
- c. 5% or more of the units constructed will be sold at initial sale for a price that can be afforded by a household with an income not more than 80% of the median family income for Rockingham County, as published by US Department of Housing and Urban Development;
- d. Units will be sold with deed restrictions and a recorded housing agreement that limit, for a period of 5 years, the resale value of the unit to not more than the purchase price plus two times the accumulated consumer price index.
- e. The units shall be on-site.

Affordability shall be defined as housing that can be purchased under a conventional mortgage whereby the combined annual expenses for principal, interest and property taxes will not exceed 30% of household income

Article 8: Zoning Amendment #7: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 7, Section 7.7 General Regulations Governing Open Space Development by creating a new subsection entitled, 7.7.6 Allowance for Lots Separated by a Municipal Trail to read as follows: Parcels separated by a municipal trail right-of-way may be considered contiguous land. All applicable setbacks from public rights-of-way (ROW) shall still apply.

Article 9: Zoning Amendment #8: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 11, Public Capital Facilities Impact Fee by proposing multiple revisions throughout the entire article. Full text of proposed amendment shall read as follows:

"Article 11. Public Capital Facilities Impact Fee

11.1 AUTHORITY AND APPLICABILITY

- 11.1.1 This Article is authorized by New Hampshire RSA 674:21 as an innovative land use control. The administration of this article shall be the responsibility of the Planning Board. This Article, as well as regulations and studies adopted by the Planning Board consistent with and in furtherance of this Article, shall govern the assessment of impact fees imposed upon new development in order to meet the needs occasioned by that development for the construction or improvement of capital facilities owned or operated by the Town of Exeter, the Exeter School District, or the Exeter Region Cooperative School District.
- 11.1.2 The public facilities for which impact fees may be assessed in Exeter may include water treatment and distribution facilities; waste water treatment and disposal facilities; sanitary sewer; storm-water, drainage and flood control facilities; public road systems and right-of way; municipal office facilities; public school facilities including a proportional share of capital facilities of the Exeter Region Cooperative School District; public safety facilities; public library facilities; and public recreation facilities not including public open space.

- 11.1.3 Prior to assessing an impact fee with exception of off-site improvements required by the Planning Board for one or more of the public capital facilities enumerated above, the Planning Board shall adopt such studies or methodologies and related fee schedules that provide for a process or method of calculating the proportionate share of capital improvement costs that are attributable to new development. Such calculations shall reasonably reflect the capital cost associated with the increased demand placed on capital facility capacity by new development.
- 11.1.4 The following regulations shall govern the assessment of impact fees for public capital facilities in order to accommodate increased demand on the capacity of these facilities due to new development.

11.2 PURPOSE

- 11.2.1 Assist in the implementation of the Town of Exeter Master Plan:
- 11.2.2 Provide for the planning and provision of public capital facilities necessitated by the growth of the Town of Exeter;
- 11.2.3 Provide adequate school system capacity to accommodate growth in public school enrollment generated by new development.
- 11.2.4 Assess an equitable proportion of growth-related costs of new and expanded public capital facilities to new development, in proportion to the facility demands created by that development.

11.3 FINDINGS

The Town of Exeter hereby finds that:

- 11.3.1 The Town of Exeter is responsible for and committed to the provision of public capital facilities and services at standards determined by the Town to be necessary to support development in a manner which protects and promotes the public health, safety and welfare:
- 11.3.2 An impact fee ordinance for public capital facilities is consistent with the goals and objectives of the Master Plan and the Capital Improvements Program of the Town of Exeter;
- 11.3.3 New development in Exeter will create the need for the construction, equipment, or expansion of public facilities in order to provide adequate public capital facilities for its residents and businesses.
- 11.3.4 Impact fees may be used to assess an equitable share of the growth-related cost of the capacity of public capital facilities resulting from the new development in proportion to the facility demands created by that development;
- 11.3.5 Impact fees assessed pursuant to this Ordinance will not exceed the cost of:
 - A. Providing additional expanded public capital facilities necessitated by new development in Exeter; and/or
 - **B.** Compensating the Town of Exeter, the Exeter School District, or the Exeter Region Cooperative School District for public capital facility capacity that it provided in anticipation of new development in Exeter.

11.4 DEFINITIONS

The following terms are defined for purposes of this article.

- 11.4.1 <u>Fee Payer</u>: The applicant for a permit that would create new development as defined in this ordinance.
- 11.4.2 Public Capital Facilities: Facilities and equipment owned, maintained or operated by the Town of Exeter, the Exeter School District, or the Exeter Region Cooperative School District.

 Facilities which are eligible for impact fee assessment under this Ordinance may include any or all of the facilities which are specifically delineated under NHRSA § 674:21 (V).
- 11.4.3 Gross Floor Area: The sum of the areas of all floors of main and accessory buildings on the lot as measured to the outside surface of the exterior walls. The gross floor area shall include basement, lobbies, and stair openings, elevator shafts and storage. The gross floor area shall exclude open wells, (atriums), mechanical rooms, crawl spaces and attics without floors, attics used only for mechanical services, porches, balconies and open-sided roofed-over areas.

11.4.4 New Development: An activity, which results in:

- A. The creation of a new dwelling or dwelling units (as defined by Article 2.2 "Definition" contained in this Zoning Ordinance); or
- **B.** The conversion of a legally existing use, or additions thereto, which would result in a net increase in the number of residential units; or
- C. Construction of a new non-residential building or, a net increase in the gross floor area of any non-residential building; or
- **D.** The conversion of an existing use to another use if such change creates a net increase in the demand on public capital facilities that are the subject of impact fee assessment methodologies adopted by the Planning Board; or
- E. A new or modified service connection to the public water system or the public wastewater disposal system of the Town of Exeter that would result in a net increase in demand on the capacity of these facilities.

New Development shall not include the replacement of an existing mobile home, or the reconstruction of a structure that has been destroyed by fire or natural disaster where there is no change in its size, intensification of, or type of use, and where there is no net increase in demand on public capital facilities.

11.5 COMPUTATION OF IMPACT FEE

11.5.1 The amount of each impact fee shall be assessed in accordance with subdivision and site plan regulations adopted by the Planning Board, or with written procedures or methodologies adopted and amended by the Planning Board and accepted by the Board of Selectmen for the purpose of public capital facility impact fee assessment in Exeter. The computation of an impact fee shall be based on formulas or methods that include documentation of the procedures used to establish the amount of the impact fee. The amount of any impact fee shall be computed based on the municipal public capital improvement cost of providing adequate public capital facility capacity to serve new development. Such documentation shall be available for public inspection in the Planning Department of the Exeter Town Office.

11.5.2. In the case of new development created by the conversion or modification of an existing use, the impact fee assessed shall be computed based upon the net increase in the impact fee assessment for the new use as compared to the highest impact that was, or would have been, assessed for the previous use in existence on or after the effective date of this Ordinance.

11.6 ASSESSMENT & PAYMENT OF IMPACT FEE

- 11.6.1 Impact fees may be assessed by the Code Enforcement Officer, prior to or as a condition to issuance of a building permit on new development to compensate the Town of Exeter for the proportional share of the public capital facility costs generated by the development. The Code Enforcement Officer may accept impact fee payment at the time the building permit is being issued.
- 11.6.2 Impact fees shall normally be collected as a condition for the issuance of a certificate of occupancy. In the case of impact fees for off-site capital improvements that are to be constructed simultaneously with new development, and where sufficient non-impact fee funds have been appropriated to create the capital improvements, the fee may be collected at the time a building permit is issued. The Town of Exeter and the fee payer may establish an alternate, mutually acceptable schedule of payment.
- 11.6.3 Any person who seeks a permit for new development, may be required to pay the public capital facility impact fees established by the Town of Exeter authorized under this Ordinance, except where all or part of the fees are waived in accordance with the criteria for waivers established in this Ordinance.

11.7 WAIVERS

The Planning Board may grant a full or partial waiver of impact fees where the Board finds that one or more of the following criteria are met with respect to the particular capital facilities for which impact fees are normally assessed.

- 11.7.1 A person may request a full or partial waiver of school facility impact fees for those residential units that are lawfully restricted to occupancy by senior citizens age 62 or over. The Planning Board may waive school impact fee assessments on age-restricted units where it finds that the property will be bound by lawful deeded restrictions on occupancy for a period of at least 20-years.
- 11.7.2 The Planning Board may agree to waive all or part of an impact fee assessment and accept in lieu of a cash payment, a proposed contribution of real property or facility improvements of equivalent value and utility to the public. The value of contributions or improvements shall be credited only toward facilities of like kind, and may not be credited to other categories of impact fee assessment. Full or partial waivers may not be based on the value of exactions for on-site or off-site improvements required by the Planning Board as a result of subdivision or site plan review, and which would be required of the developer regardless of the impact fee assessment authorized by this Article.
- 11.7.3 The Planning Board may waive an impact fee assessment for a particular capital facility where it finds that the subject property has previously been assessed for its proportionate share of public capital facility impacts, or has contributed payments or constructed capital facility improvements equivalent in value to the dollar amount of the fee(s) waived.
- 11.7.4 A person may request a full or partial waiver of impact fees, other than those that expressly protect public health standards, for construction within a plat or site plan approved by the Planning Board prior to the effective date of this Article (November 20th, 2001). Prior to granting such a waiver, the Board must find that the proposed construction is entitled to the four year exemption provided by RSA 674:39, pursuant to that statute.

11.8 APPEALS

11.8.1 A party aggrieved by a decision under this Article may appeal such decision to the Superior Court as provided by RSA 676:5, III and RSA 677:15 as amended.

11.9 ADMINISTRATION OF FUNDS COLLECTED

Any impact fee collected shall be properly identified by and promptly transferred for deposit in an appropriate Public Capital Facilities Impact Fee Account and used solely for the purposes for which it was collected. Impact fee accounts shall be special revenue fund accounts and under no circumstance will impact fee revenue accrue to the general fund.

11.10 CUSTODY AND MAINTENANCE OF FUND ACCOUNTS

- 11.10.1 A separate Public Capital Facilities Impact Fee account shall be established for each type of capital facility for which an impact fee is assessed
- 11.10.2 At the end of each fiscal year, the Finance Director shall make a report giving a particular account of all impact fee transactions during the year.

11.11 USE OF FUNDS

- 11.11.1 Funds withdrawn from any public facilities impact fee account shall be used solely for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, facility equipment, or making improvements to the particular public capital facilities for which the account is designated.
- 11.11.2 In the event that bonds or similar debt instruments have been issued for public capital facilities which were constructed in anticipation of current growth, or are issued for advance provision of capital facilities for which public capital facilities impact fees may be expended, impact fees may be used to pay debt service on such bonds or similar debt instruments.

11.12 REFUND OF FEES PAID

The owner of record of property for which an impact fee has been paid shall be entitled to a refund of that fee, plus accrued interest where:

- 11.12.1 The impact fee has not been encumbered or legally bound to be spent for the purpose for which it was collected within a period of six (6) years from that date of the final payment of the fee; or
- 11.12.2 The Town has failed, within the period of six (6) years from the date of the final payment of such fee, to appropriate the non-impact fee (town) share to related capital improvements costs.

11.13 ADDITIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Payment of a public capital facilities impact fee does not restrict the Town or the Planning Board in requireing other payments from the fee payer, including, but not limited to, water and sewer hook up fees and other fees related to the cost for extensions of water and sewer mains, including road improvements or other infrastructure and facility needs specifically benefiting the development not other-wise included in the public capital facilities impact fee.

11.14 PREMATURE AND SCATTERED DEVELOPMENT

Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed so as to limit the existing authority of the Exeter Planning Board to provide against development, which is scattered or premature, requires an excessive expenditure of public funds, or is otherwise contrary to the Town of Exeter Zoning Ordinance or Site Plan Review and Subdivision Regulations.

11.15 Review

Procedures and methodologies that are adopted for the purpose of calculating the amount of an impact fee shall be reviewed by the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board at a minimum of five-year intervals, and may be amended periodically after public hearing.

Article 10: Zoning Amendment #9: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 12, Board of Adjustment, Section 12.4 Limits of Approval by reducing the time period for the validity of approvals granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment from six (6) years to three (3) years.

Article 11: To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Auditors or Committees for the ensuing year.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) for the acquisition of conservation easements or open space land by the Town, all for the perm anent protection of appropriate undeveloped land in the Town of Exeter, and to authorize the Selectmen and the Conservation Commission to act on behalf of the Town in connection with such acquisitions of conservation easements or open space land pursuant to NH RSA 36-A, and to further authorize the issuance of not more than Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) of bond and/or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate and regulate such bonds and/or notes and to determine the rates of interest thereon. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation. A three-fifths ballot vote is required.)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,700,000) for the purpose of designing a new water treatment plant, by the issuance of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, with all expenses to be paid from rate payer fees. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation. A three-fifths ballot vote is required.)

Article 14: Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes therein, totaling \$14,385,315? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$13,718,984 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept in the name of the Town a release deed and covenant from the Boston and Maine Corporation, conveying all of its rights, title and interest to the Town of Exeter in the railroad bridge at Park Street in Exeter, New Hampshire, shown as Bridge No. 50.62 on Federal Evaluation Plan 2, Map 49. This conveyance is understood to be subject to the terms of a Memorandum of Understanding among the State of New Hampshire, Boston and Maine Corporation, and Springfield Terminal Railroad Company, dated November 13, 2001 and the exhibits there to.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of The Ambulance Charter as recommended by the Board of Selectmen and also to establish a Town Ambulance Expendable Trust Fund, with the Fund to be used as described in The Ambulance Charter and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend monies from said fund.

Article 17: Shall we adopt an exemption for the disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value for quail-fied taxpayers shall be \$70,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$24,000; or if married, a combined income of not more than \$36,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$125,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$350,000 for the purpose of making improvements to the Guinea Rd/Hampton Road intersection, of which \$150,000 will be paid out of private funds associated with nearby development. (Three of the five members of the Board of Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$109,500, to be added to the previously established Town Retirement Sick Leave Expendable Trust Fund, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend monies from said fund. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to accept the financial terms of a Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Town of Exeter and the Exeter Police Association, calling for the implementation of the Pay and Classification Study dated August 2001 that calls for the use of a 10 step pay plan, with a 3% pay and benefit increase between annual steps over the life of the 5 year agreement, as well as a 2.6% cost of living increase annually at step 10 during the first 3 years of the agreement and 3% annually during the remaining two years of the agreement and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$97,925 in calendar year 2003, these sums representing the additional costs attributed to the increase in Department salaries and benefits paid over those budgeted for the 2003 fiscal year. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation).

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$80,500 for the purpose of replacing the copper roof on the Town Bandstand. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$80,000 for the purpose of replacing the furnaces and adjacent duct work in the Town Hall. (Four of the five members of the Board of Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of determining the location and designing an additional fire station. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of regrading pit walls at what is known as "Simpson's Pit" in support of public safety and in anticipation of its reuse for recreational purposes. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$66,000 for the purpose of acquiring replacement protective clothing for the Town's firefighters. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a lease purchase agreement for the purpose of lease purchasing a replacement sewer vacuum truck used by the Water and Sewer Division to clean sewer pipes and manholes, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000, which represents the first of 5 annual payments (a total of \$325,000), for this purpose, with all expenses to be paid from rate payer fees. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$60,000 to be added to the Tennis Court Capital Reserve Fund previously established for this purpose and to recommend that there be a cost sharing agreement with the Exeter Region Co-Operative School District to help finance the project. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of preparing a preliminary design for a replacement for the Park St. Bridge, of which \$45,000 will be reimbursed by the State of New Hampshire. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of addressing space needs and designing renovations to the Town Office Building. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$40,000 for the purpose of replacing the storm water sewer between Lincoln St. and the rear of Lincoln St. School. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$40,000 for the purpose of replacing and/or repairing approximately one third of the windows at the Town Hall. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$40,000 for the purpose of undertaking an evaluation and hydraulic study of the Town's storm water system in compliance with State and Federal requirements. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of purchasing CAD (Computer Aided Design) software, a workstation and plotter for drafting designs and interfacing with the existing Department of Public Works GIS system. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$13,000, for support of Area Home Care, an agency that provides assistance in the areas of light housekeeping, meal preparation, shopping, laundry and other housekeeping tasks so that clients are able to continue to reside in their homes. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$11,900 for the purpose of continuing to implement the Geographic Information System Needs Analysis for the Town, expanding availability among Town Office Departments. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$10,000, to be added to the Bus Replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established for this purpose. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 37: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$5,000, for support of A Safe Place, an agency that provides shelter for battered women and their children, court and welfare advocacy, peer counseling and support groups for victims of partner abuse. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

- Article 38: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$5,000, for support of SeaCare Health Services, an agency that provides health services that help people who do not have health insurance and cannot afford to pay for medical services, get health care. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 39: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$3,500, for the support of Cross Roads House, an agency that provides a safe and supportive emergency and transitional shelter to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 40: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$3,000, for the support of Sexual Assault Support Services, an agency that provides services that is committed to supporting victims/survivors in their effort to heal from the trauma of sexual assault and childhood sexual abuse, while striving to prevent the occurrence of sexual violence in local communities and in society at large. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 41: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$2,000, for the support of New Outlook, a youth program for middle and high school students that provides services of a community that engages youth in opportunities that nurture belonging, independence, resilience, and social responsibility. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 42: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$1,500, for the support of the Community Diversion Program, an agency that provides services to youth who are at risk, to eliminate the need for court involvement. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 43: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$1,030, for support of the Society for the Protection of Cruelty to Animals, an agency that provides shelter and adoptive services for lost and abandoned animals. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)
- Article 44: To see if the Town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, in its first two years of operation, the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) has helped communities throughout New Hampshire preserve their natural, cultural and historic resources and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should maintain funding for LCHIP in the next biennial budget.
- Article 45: To see if the Town will vote, upon request of Susan Henderson (owner of the property known as THE INN BY THE BANDSTAND), to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate and convey the Town's interest in the northern 1/5, or 2 feet of a 10 foot wide, jointly held right of way between historic property shown as tax map number 72, lot 16 and tax map number 72, lot 1; properties more commonly known as the Inn by the Bandstand and the Town Office Building.
- Article 46: On petition of Laurence A. Celluci and others to see if the Town will vote to eliminate the Blue Bag user fee of (\$1.25ea/\$12.50 per 10) and any other related costs if any, currently paid by the users.
- Article 47: On petition of Alan Bailey and others to see if the Town will vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Exeter, based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age and up to the age of 75 years \$100,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$125,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$150,000. To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five (5) years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the person's spouse owns the real estate, they must have been married for at least five (5) years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$31,500; or if married, a combined net income of less than \$37,500; and own net assets not in excess of \$150,000; excluding the value of the persons residence.

Article 48: On petition of Eileen Blanchard and others, in accordance with Title III, Chapter 32, Revised Statutes Annotated 32:1, shall the voters of the Town of Exeter vote to create a Municipal Budget Committee and, if so, said committee shall consist of nine (9) elected at-large members, in concurrence with the 2004 Annual Town Meeting?

Article 49: On petition of John Martin and others, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to share the following resolution with state and national officials, as well as any presidential candidates who campaign here in 2003? The resolution reads: Whereas, NH residents pay the 12th highest cost for insurance in the country; and Whereas, the cost of health insurance premiums for families has increased by 45% over the past three years; and Whereas, 100,000 NH residents have no health coverage and 77% of them have a full-time worker at home; and Whereas, due to these rising costs almost half of NH's small businesses now cannot afford health coverage for their employees, therefore be it resolved That we, the citizens of Exeter, NH, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses and health care providers to ensure that: Everyone, including the self-employed, unemployed, un-and under-insured, and small business owners, has access to an affordable basic health plan; Everyone, including employers, consumers and the state, local and federal government makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system; Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically effective; and That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care.

Article 50: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager Town of Exeter Exeter, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Exeter as of and for the year ended December 31, 2001 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Exeter has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Exeter as of December 31, 2001, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Exeter taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Exeter. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 5 - OTHER INFORMATION

A. Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or natural disasters. During fiscal year 2001, the Town was a member of the New Hampshire Municipal Association Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc. and the New Hampshire Public Risk Management Exchange (Primex) Workers' Compensation Program. These entities are considered public entity risk pools, currently operating as common risk management and insurance programs for member towns and cities.

The New Hampshire Municipal Association Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc. is a Trust organized to provide certain property and liability insurance coverages to member towns, cities and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshire. As a member of the NHMA Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc., the Town shares in contributing to the cost of, and receiving benefits from, a self-insured pooled risk management program. The membership and coverage run from July 1 to June 30. The program includes a Self-Insured Retention Fund (SIR) from which is paid up to \$500,000 for each and every covered property, auto physical damage or crime loss, subject to a \$1,000 deductible, and each and every covered general liability and public officials' liability loss.

The Trust maintains, on behalf of its members, the following reinsurance policies shared by the membership for the year ending June 30, 2002:

1. Signet Star Reinsurance Policy #9-02-AMD-07-0001-1 which provides excess package coverage in the amount of \$1,500,000 in excess of the Trust's SIR for each and every loss.

- 2. Swiss Reinsurance Policy #2300895 which provides Excess Property/Excess Flood coverage in excess of the Trust's SIR.
- 3. Hartford Steam Boiler Policy #FBP-CH-2213346 which provides a \$50,000,000 limit resulting from any "one accident" subject to a \$1,000 deductible.
- 4. Royal Insurance Company Policy #RHD309238 which provides a \$51,000,000 limit resulting from Flood and Earthquake and \$7,000,000 resulting from any "one accident" for Flood in Zone A subject to a \$1,000 deductible.

Contributions paid in 2001 for FY2002 ending June 30, 2002, to be recorded as an insurance expenditure totaled \$120,074. There were no unpaid contributions for the year ending June 30, 2002 and due in 2001. During December 2001, \$10,572 was returned to the Town in the form of a check as its 2001 "dividend" for the years 1994, 1995 and 1996. The trust agreement permits the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in Trust assets to meet its liabilities. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood of an additional assessment for any of the past years.

The New Hampshire Public Risk Management Exchange (Primex) Workers' Compensation Program is a pooled risk management program under RSAs 5-B and 281-A. The workers' compensation and employer's liability policy provides statutory coverage for workers' compensation and up to \$2,000,000 of employer's liability coverage. Primex retained \$300,000 of each loss through June 30, and \$500,000 from July 1 onward. The membership and coverage run from January 1 through December 31. The estimated net contribution from the Town of Exeter billed and paid for the year ended December 31, 2001 was \$71,110. The member participation agreement permits Primex to make additional assessments to members, should there be a deficiency in contributions for any member year, not to exceed the member's annual contribution. At this time, Primex foresees no likelihood of an assessment for this or any prior year.

B. Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Plan Description and Provisions

The Town of Exeter participates in the New Hampshire Retirement System (The System) which is the administrator of a cost-sharing multiple-employer contributory pension plan and trust established in 1967 by RSA 100-A:2 and is qualified as a tax-exempt organization under Sections 401(a) and 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan is a contributory, defined benefit plan providing service, disability, death and vested retirement benefits to members and their beneficiaries. Provisions for benefits and contributions are established and can be amended by the New Hampshire State Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that may be obtained by writing the New Hampshire Retirement System, 4 Chenell Drive, Concord, NH 03301.

TOWN OF EXETER, NEW HAMPSHIRE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2001

Description of Funding Policy

The System is financed by contributions from both the employees and the Town. Member contribution rates are established and may be amended by the State legislature while employer contribution rates are set by the System trustees based on an actuarial valuation. Police officers and firefighters are required to contribute 9.3% of gross earnings. For the period January 1 through June 30, 2001, the Town contributed 4.93% for police officers and 5.70% for firefighters. From July 1 through December 31, 2001, the rates were 5.33% for police officers and 6.61% for firefighters. The contribution requirements for the Town of Exeter for the years 1999, 2000, and 2001 were \$111,419, \$123,676, and \$133,794, respectively, which were paid in full in each year.

The State of New Hampshire funds 35% of employer costs for firefighters and police officers employed by the Town. GASB Statement No. 24, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Grants and Other Financial Assistance requires this amount to be reported as a revenue and expenditure in the Town's financial statements. This amount \$70,239 has been included on Exhibit B - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances - All Governmental Fund Types and Expendable Trust Funds and is reconciled to the budgetary expenditures in Note 1D.

C. Summary Disclosure of Significant Contingencies

Litigation

There are various claims and suits pending against the Town which arise in the normal course of the Town's activities. In the opinion of management, the ultimate disposition of these various claims and suits will not have a material effect on the financial position of the Town.

Grants

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by such grantor agencies, principally the Federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$9,744,176.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (The School Board recommends \$9,781,546.00 as set forth on said budget.)
- 2. Shall the District approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Exeter School Board and the Exeter Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits totaling:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$231,787.00 for the 2003-04 school year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year? (The School Board recommends this appropriation.)

- 3. Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$250,000.00 to be added to the special reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1-c established by the 1997 District Meeting for the purpose of creating a fund to be used to offset the Exeter taxpayers' share of the Exeter Region Cooperative School District's bond payments (principal and interest) for the new middle level cooperative school building for the fiscal years from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2017? [The Exeter School District is receiving buy-out payments from the Coop for ten years (1998-2007). However, the Exeter taxpayers' share of the bond payments on the new middle school will continue for an additional ten years after the buy-out payments cease. The purpose of this Article is to reserve a portion of the proceeds from next year's buy-out payment to offset the Exeter taxpayers' share of the bond payment in years 11 through 20. A capital reserve fund for this purpose and the first appropriation were approved by the voters at the 1997 annual meeting.] (The School Board recommends this appropriation.)
- 4. Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$240,000.00 to be added to the capital reserve fund established by the 2002 annual meeting under RSA 35:1, for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of school buildings and/or school ground site improvements, including associated engineering and architectural fees? [The Exeter School District is receiving buy-out payments from the Coop for ten years (1998-2007). The purpose of this Article is to reserve a portion of the buy-out proceeds from the Coop to ease the future financial impact on the Exeter taxpayers for the cost of renovations to the Exeter School District elementary schools.] (The School Board recommends this appropriation.)
 - 5. To hear reports of agents, auditors, and committees or officers heretofore chosen.
 - 6. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

SECOND SESSION: At the Exeter Town Hall in said Exeter on Tuesday, March 11, 2003, to choose the following School District officer(s): two (2) school board members for a three (3) year term; and to vote on the articles listed as 1, 2, 3, and 4, above, as those articles may be amended at the First Session; by ballot, the polls to open at eight of the clock in the forenoon, and to close no earlier than eight of the clock in the evening.

Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Exeter School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Exeter School District as of June 30, 2002, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Exeter School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Exeter School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the School Board Exeter School District Exeter, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Exeter School District for the year ended June 30, 2002, we considered the School District's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the School District's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the general purpose financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the School District's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to applicable individuals during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

EXETER PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

I would like to express my sincere thanks to you, the people of Exeter, for allowing me to serve you the past thirty-one years and 3 months as your Director of Parks & Recreation. I will be retiring in January 2003, so this is my last town report.

For those of you who are new to the community, I hope this report gives you a better understanding of your new community's Parks & Recreation Department. For those who have been long time residents, this may serve as a reminder of your involvement.

We have seen many changes over the years. I think the major project in my time as your Director was the development of the Exeter Recreation Park in the early 70's, thanks to a vision of the following people who supported what we felt and still feel was best for the Town of Exeter: Paul Holloway, Jr., John Bell, Harry Thayer III, William Gilmore, Bob Barney, Brad Wetherell, Dr. Lucius Hill, yours truly, and the late Frank Games, John Gilmore and Richard Whitney. These men gave many hours of support both in time and financially to see that this project was completed for our community. It is a project that I take great pride in and will continue to be proud of accomplishing with the help of the above men and you the community for your support. I know many of the young-sters, who were in grades 1-6 at the time and worked on the "Can Drive", won't forget the fun and support that was shown to them in the project at that time.

I was the third full time Director hired by the town and I hope that I contributed something for the betterment of the community during my years here in Exeter. I will miss many of you who have supported our department. I tried to be fair with everyone, and made my decisions based on what I thought was in the best interest of the community at large. I made mistakes as we all do, but hope they were few and far between. I was fortunate to serve as the New Hampshire Parks & Recreation Association as President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. I also served on the American Parks & Recreation Society National Board of Directors twice, in 1980 and again in 1990, representing the New England area for two years each time with the support of the town and those in the Parks and Recreation field in the New England region. We have had tremendous support over the years from the Board of Selectmen, the townspeople, the Parks & Recreation Advisory Boards, the newspapers, radio, and TV stations. One of the highlights of my years in Exeter was receiving Tennis Magazine's kudos that included Exeter Parks & Recreation's ten tennis courts in the list of the "50 Best Municipal Tennis Complexes" in the entire country in 1978. What an honor that was for this small community. We still have the plaque in our trophy case.

There are many projects that need to be accomplished in the next few years provided the department's annual budgets continue to be approved by the Town Meeting votes. These include the reconstruction of the eight tennis and two basketball courts at the Recreation Park. Some other projects in the Town Master Capital Plan and the Park Study Committee's projects include lights at the tennis courts, renovation of the outdoor swimming pool, the development of the Simpson Recreation Area and the continued upkeep of Planet Playground. We have been very fortunate over the years to have the support for Parks & Recreation. My only hope is that the parks remain part of the Recreation Department, as Parks & Recreation work hand in hand and should stay as a team. I can only hope that you continue to support a viable Parks and Recreation Department with your vote & through your volunteerism.

Some of the programs that were started or continued during my thirty-one years as a Department Head included Exeter Youth Hockey, Exeter Swim Team, swim lessons, the tennis program, the summer PlayCamp, summer sport camps, youth, middle school and high school age basketball, as well as our music and arts programs over the years. Others include youth and adult sports and special events like the annual Peanut Carnival, the annual Town-wide Easter Egg Hunt and Toddler Hunt, the "Summer In The Parks" Concert Series, the annual Halloween parade, the Lettersto-Santa program, the trips program, and the ownership of a coach bus, thanks, in part, to the Exeter Lions Club and you, the community. The certification of all our volunteer coaches was one of the most important programs that we offered during the last twenty years.

Some recent updates made in the department include computers for program registrations, the acceptance of credit cards and the upgrade of many of our parks and commons. My first budget was around \$39,000.00, with that including the salaries of the maintenance man, secretary, and myself. The budget in 2002 was about \$740,000.00, all-inclusive. Our department generates more than \$300,000.00 in revenue and donations through the year to help support the department, something many folks in the community may not be aware of.

I am proud that in my years in Exeter I never overspent my entire budget. We always returned money to the town at the end of the year.

I must say thank you to my Assistant Director, Jan French Dicey, CPRP, as she has brought a great deal to the department and community since her arrival in 1979, from one of Greater Boston YMCA's divisions.

Some of the other programs started include the Exeter Council On Aging and the Senior Citizens' Discount Taxi program (the only program of its kind in the entire country). Both of these programs are 30 years old in 2003. The renovation of the old fire department into the current Senior Citizens' Center was completed in 1985. Before that, the senior citizens' program started here at the Recreation Center, with the Somersworth Housing Authority helping with our senior meals program. The featured area for those programs is now the ceramics room and the DAV office.

If I may indulge you for a moment, I'd like to conclude this annual report with one of my heroes, Roy Rogers sayings, "May the Good Lord take a liking to you," and my high school yearbook caption, "Life without sports is not life."

Again, thank you to all the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board members over the years for your support and volunteer hours to our community. Thanks also goes to all the youth sport volunteer coaches, and other program's volunteers. Your efforts and spirit of volunteerism have contributed immeasurably to this community's successes. I will miss you all.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

We continued work on our project to take digital photographs of all the buildings in the Historic District. Our goal is to be able, during meetings of the Historic District Commission (HDC), to project pictures along with the applicable tax maps of the properties being discussed. Projections could be on a lap top computer or on a larger screen. Having the pictures of the properties as they are now and their exact location in town would facilitate the discussions between owners and commission members.

We met with members of the Portsmouth HDC to share ideas. We learned how much more complicated their job is than ours because of the size of their Historic District and the varied types of buildings in it. We gained some useful information from the meeting.

As a result of working with the Preservation Guidelines for the Exeter Historic District as adopted by the Commission in the fall of 2000, and implemented as of January 2001, we have determined that the guidelines require some clarification in certain areas. We have also received some recommendations from owners in the Historic District that were not incorporated in the adopted guidelines. We've started work on revising them and anticipate public hearings on the proposed changes early next year. We would like to extend an invitation to any interested residents to join us at our monthly meetings on the third Thursday of each month.

Water and Sewer Advisory Committee

The Town of Exeter's *Water and Sewer Advisory Committee* is a volunteer board of residents providing technical and financial input to the Board of Selectmen and the Department of Public Works (DPW) on facility and infrastructure capital projects, annual budgeting, and long term management approach. In 2002, we concentrated on the continued planning and implementation of significant upgrades to aged infrastructure and facilities in an effort to provide quality services to residents and businesses for the next 20-25 years.

Our largest efforts of the year involved analyses and preliminary designs for major water system improvements to the Portsmouth Avenue treatment plant, portions of which date to the late 1800s. The Committee assisted the DPW and the town's technical consultant during site selection and assessment, new facility process pilot studies, and a Value Engineering cost analysis exercise. Other water system projects conducted during the year included members providing input on town committees charged with protecting the Dearborn Brook watershed, one of the town's primary water sources, as well as the Planning Department's Visioning Steering Committee charged with updating the town's Master Plan.

On the sewer side of operations, the Committee also worked with DPW to complete construction of a new outfall from the Newfields Road treatment facility to the Squamscott River that will bring the town into compliance with new Federal regulations regarding ammonia and copper. Other sewer system projects conducted during the year included continued infrastructure upgrades recommended in the 2001 Facilities Plan update.

The Committee provided input to DPW during selection of a consultant in 2002 to review the Town's water and sewer rate structure and overall cash flow requirements to operate the utility. Our rates have been relatively unchanged since 1992 with a minor adjustment in 1996, a significant accomplishment considering the significant capital and operations improvements made to the systems in that timeframe. Impacts of above described construction efforts are being considered, and work on a new rate structure is ongoing at this time.

Our budgeting process was again a collaborative effort between the Committee, DPW and the Departments of Finance and Planning in order to coordinate work and efforts in other areas of town. We once again used the strategy of incorporating several infrastructure improvement projects and equipment upgrades into the budget while keeping overall expense increases relatively flat. This approach has been successfully used since 1999 in advance of significant capital improvements to both systems beginning in 2003.

The Committee looks forward to 2003 as a continued interactive process with town departments and ratepayers to implement appropriate facility upgrades for a fair and reasonable cost. We wish to thank in particular town employees who continually assist us in serving the needs of the Town of Exeter: George Olson, Town Manager; Keith Noyes, Director of Public Works; Victoria Del Greco, Water & Sewer superintendent; Jennifer Royce, P.E., Town Engineer. This year, water facilities staff, Tony Calderone and Dan Daigle, have greatly assisted data collection efforts during the preliminary design phase of the proposed new water treatment plant.



Specifically – 864 permits were issued in 2002, compared to last year's total of 714 for the same time period. PLANNING BOARD

The Exeter Planning Board is entrusted with the task of encouraging and directing appropriate land use in the town of Exeter. The Board is composed of citizen volunteers appointed by the Exeter Selectmen. The Board strives to enhance and preserve the character of the community by adhering to three basic sets of responsibility.

- 1. It is responsible for the preparation and amendment of the Town's:
 - a. master plan
 - b. capital improvement plan
 - c. subdivision regulations
 - d. site plan review regulations
- 2. Within these plans and regulations, the Board is responsible for the review and approval of all:
 - a. subdivisions
 - b. lot line adjustments
 - c. site plans for non-residential uses and multi-family dwelling units.
- 3. Annually, the Board reviews and then recommends, as appropriate, amendments to the Town's zoning ordinances for consideration by the Town's citizens.

This past year has been a busy one for the Board. Several new residential and commercial reviews have passed through the Board. There has been continued work on visioning of the Epping Road corridor as well as continued subcommittee work on the Town's Master Plan update. In addition, the Board is now evaluating the use of impact fees to support the expanded town services required by growth. Smart growth principles are used in the management of growth and development in the Town. The Board continues to help define an effective capital improvement plan in conjunction with the Exeter Schools and Public services.

The Board generally meets every second and fourth Thursday of the month at 7:00PM in the Nowak Room of the Town Office Building. The Board encourages the public to attend and participate at these meetings. These meetings are also televised on EXTV, channel 22, the Town's government and education channel.

The Board is very appreciative of all the support and expertise of Sylvia von Aulock, the Town Planner, as well as the Planning Department. This department is extremely busy but manages to keep up with, and produce excellent work. The Board is also grateful of the support, cooperation and participation of the citizens. We hope for your continued support of the Board in the future.

EXETER ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Exeter Zoning Board of Adjustment sits as a five member quasi-judicial body to hear and decide on four types of applications: variance, special exception, appeal from an administrative decision and equitable waivers of dimensional requirements.

An application for a variance alleges that a literal enforcement of a particular provision of the zoning ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship. An application for a special exception is a request to permit a specific use subject to meeting certain criteria set forth in the Zoning Ordinance. An appeal from an administrative decision involves a request for review of a decision by an administrative official with respect to enforcement of any provision of the Zoning Ordinance. An equitable waiver of a dimensional requirement may be granted if the Board finds that a zoning setback requirement has mistakenly been violated despite a good faith effort to comply with the regulations.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment met eleven (11) times in 2002 and considered a total of eighteen (18) applications. Three (3) applications for variance were heard and all were granted. Twelve (12) applications for special exception were heard, and all applications were granted. One application for special exception was filed although not heard by the Board, as it was determined that the application was not necessary. One (1) application for an Appeal from an Administrative Decision was filed, although not heard by the Board as it was determined that the Zoning Board of Adjustment was not the proper governing body to review such an appeal. The Board granted one (1) equitable waiver of dimensional requirements.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Nowak Room of the Town Office Building. The Board would encourage any residents with an interest in participating on this Board to contact the Planning & Building Department.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT

As in previous years, the Planning Department was as busy as a one armed juggler. What were we juggling besides the usual amount of development proposals? In one word: subcommittees. The year consisted of juggling teams and committees for the Exeter Master Plan, Capital Improvement Program, Historic Downtown Restoration Project, Impact Fee Project and Zoning Amendments to name a few. Furthermore, as Town Planner I represented the Town on numerous regional and local committees including Coast Transportation, Metropolitan Planning Organization, Transportation Advisory Committee, Exeter Development Commission, Chamber of Commerce Business Development Committee, Downtown Parking Study, Traffic Calming Group, Exeter Dearborn Brook Watershed Project, and NROC (Natural Resource Outreach Coalition) Seacoast Project.

Several positive outcomes resulted from all the hard work and collaboration of many volunteers and professionals who were involved with these projects. First, the Planning Board adopted the revised chapters of the Master Plan. The chapters included Land Use, Parks and Recreation and Community Facilities. Second, Coast Transportation agreed to revise their bus schedule in order to better connect with the DownEaster train schedule. Third, the regional NROC effort allowed Exeter an opportunity to receive a \$10,000 grant that was put towards establishment of a Conservation Commission Newsletter. Fourth, through the Downtown Parking Committee and the Traffic Calming Group, the Town and Phillips Exeter Academy have teamed up to create win-win solutions for a variety of challenges for both the Town and the Academy. Fifth, the Exeter Dearborn Brook Watershed Project has created communication bridges between Stratham and Exeter in working towards safeguarding this valuable watershed. Sixth, the Town hired a consultant to develop a methodology for charging impact fees for development impacting schools, emergency fire department services and parks and recreation services. One final mention, our Capital Improvement Program process was once again fine-tuned and improved and presented a month earlier to the budget committee.

The Planning Department also hosted several community and staff workshops in 2002. The first were the exciting Master Plan Visioning Sessions. Well attended and hailed as awesome experiences by those who attended, the Visioning Sessions acted as the central stage for public input to the chapters being focused on in 2002. Another event was a presentation by NROC representatives, focusing on regional growth impact on natural resources. The Department also hosted a presentation on the Town's GIS (geographical information system) for all interested staff and volunteers. This presentation allowed anyone interested to see the technical mapping advances available to many of the town's departments and get an understanding of what is to come. Finally, in October, we helped to organize the Epping Road Corridor Visioning Session focused on possible land use changes along Epping Road.

Naturally, I could not have accomplished all these projects and successes alone. First, the professional teamwork approach of the Planning and Building Department staff have laid the foundation for these events and projects, and for that I would like to thank my team: Doug Eastman, Barbara McEvoy, Linda Bruce, Art French and our site inspectors, Gordon Wilkes and John Hayes. Second, it cannot go without saying that it is also due to the amazing volunteer effort that Exeter residents so impressively exemplify, that our year was so productive. I would like to thank the many people who have taken on a variety of roles to keep the planning ball rolling. Finally, I would like to thank all the Town staff and Town Boards that provide our department with their time and assistance.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT



Health Officer

Exeter Health Department activities are summarized below. A more complete breakdown of activities is included in the Exeter Fire Department Consolidated Report.

The Health Department's scope of work is to enforce the NH public health rules and laws, as well as local ordinances and regulations. The Health Officer serves as a liaison between state officials and the local community on issues concerning local public health.

The Exeter Health Department inspects and approves daycare and foster homes. We conduct sanitary investigations into complaints and nuisances, which may endanger public health, such as garbage, rodents, insects, and unsanitary conditions. We inspect health facilities, and license and inspect food service establishments.

As of October 31, 2002, Exeter has eighty-one licensed food service establishments. Four establishments changed ownership, four closed, and seven new licenses were issued. Four of the new licenses required plan reviews.

In September, one bird tested positive for West Nile Virus in Exeter. The NH Department of Health and Human Services instructed a mosquito control company to test the area for West Nile Virus infected mosquito pools. None were identified at that time.

The Health Department hosted two UNH Cooperative Extension SAFE Programs for our local food service establishments and surrounding communities. We also hosted two local area health officer-training meetings. The Deputy Health Officer attended several NH Public Health Association training programs regarding food bio-security and terrorism preparedness. The Deputy Health Officer is a member of the NH Safe Food Alliance, National Environmental Health Association, and is on the Executive Board of the NH Health Officer Association.

Emergency Management

To summarize 2002 Emergency Management efforts, we see two main areas that were addressed. The first was Seabrook Power Plant "Emergency Drills" and the second issue focused around Emergency Preparedness in the event of a terrorist incident.

First the Seabrook drills: Exeter, in conjunction with State, Federal and other local towns within the 10-mile EPZ, conducted 3 drills during the summer and fall of 2002. For Exeter they where conducted flawlessly (on our part). The final drill, the F.E.M.A graded exercise, was conducted without errors. This is due primarily to the continued effort of the participants who repeatedly contribute their time to these drills and without their support this would not be possible. I would also like to add that Exeter received an excellent rating in the performance of these drills.

On to the second issue, one of the most significant accomplishments was training. A two-day seminar was conducted by the New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management for the expressed purpose of Emergency Preparedness of Exeter Area Schools in the event of a disaster, whether the incident was of terrorist design, natural or man-made catastrophe. Training focused on preparing our teachers to properly handle this type of emergency and how to work with local and state officials in a time of crisis. This office has continually worked with Exeter Schools to better prepare them for an unforeseen catastrophe.

Our local Hazardous Materials Team, in combination with the Fire Department and N.H.O.E.M, has been directing their training efforts to the area of Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD). We have been attending classes administered by the US Army and have been conducting drills in this area. The local Haz-Mat Team has also received several sophisticated instruments to detect the presence of WMD agents.

This office continues to pursue any training or assistance, whether it is equipment and/or training offered by N.H.O.E.M or any other source to better prepare for an incident in the unfortunate case that one may occur.

This year, as in the past, I have applied for grants to help us in our Emergency Management efforts. It's now more evident than ever that we must not lose our focus to stay as prepared as possible for any type of emergency that may be presented to us.



Conservation Commission

The Commission is delighted with the purchase of the Raynes' Farm. We would like to thank the people of Exeter for supporting this acquisition. Preserving and protecting one of Exeter's historic and scenic sites is something we all can be proud of. We hope to receive another LCHIP grant later this year which we will use with matching donated monies to do much needed structural repairs to the barn.

The Dearborn Brook Watershed Committee has been meeting most of the past year researching and analyzing information about Exeter's drinking water supply source. This study has been a cooperative effort with participants from Exeter, Stratham and the Rockingham Planning Commission. Speaking of water resources, the Commission expanded their water quality testing this year to include the Little River as well as the Exeter River. The testing tracks the quality of these streams by measuring for dissolved oxygen, turbidity, temperature, conductivity and PH.

The Commission made an effort this year to better promote Exeter's open space lands. A map of selected conservation areas was produced along with a brief description of those areas. The Commission also produced an updated version of the Land Use Policies and Procedures. This document details the desirable activities for each of the Conservation Areas. It is our hope that these guidelines will enable each and every one of us to enjoy these open spaces while respecting the land and the rights of others.

Two thousand two was the third year of the tree program managed by Peter Waltz. Several trees were donated and planted for citizens throughout the town. Peter once again put on the Arbor Day program at the Lincoln Street School that culminated with students receiving tree seedlings.

Several members of the Commission participated in the Town's Master Plan Update. Work on the first three chapters was concluded in October and work continues on three more chapters this spring, including the one on Conservation and Preservation. The Commission also participated in the Natural Resource Outreach Coalition last year. This project, in cooperation with the towns of Stratham, Newfields and Newmarket, studied growth and its impact on the natural resources of the region. The coalition continues to discuss these concerns and to come up with good smart growth strategies. You may have noticed the new kiosks at the Oaklands and Henderson-Swasey Town Forest. Kudos to Steve Wilson and Dan Houston for the donation and construction of these along with the construction of several bridges on the forest trails.







SAU 16 MISSION STATEMENT

The SAU 16 School Districts are committed to working together to develop common standards and values that will result in graduates who are caring, productive and contributing members of society.

In July 2002, SAU 16 welcomed two new assistant principals to Exeter High School (EHS), Walter Garland and Mike Monahan. Mr. Garland brings to EHS his 28 years of teaching and administrative experiences, while Mr. Monahan with his 13 years of teaching will begin his administrative career with EHS. The SAU 16 Schools opened their doors in September with the following enrollments: Swasey Central School in Brentwood – 314; East Kingston Elementary School – 167; Exeter Elementary (Main Street School and Lincoln Street School) – 1030; Kensington Elementary School – 195; Newfields Elementary School – 177; Stratham Memorial School – 617; Cooperative Middle School – 1385; and Exeter High School – 1542.

Swasey Central School in Brentwood has virtually completed its addition of 12 new classrooms (2 kindergarten, 10 regular). The net gain in classrooms will only be six (6) as it was determined that the 1975 Butler Building wing, which contains six (6) classrooms, needed to be demolished. The new wing was constructed with the capacity to add a second story when needed. Also, new septic, water, mechanical and fire-protection systems will be in place when the project is completed. Kensington Elementary School is preparing to break ground in March 2003 for the construction of four (4) new classrooms, appropriate space for the nurse, a library and a multi-purpose room.

On September 19, 2002, the third Future Search Committee was organized with approximately eighty-five Exeter Region Cooperative School District (ERCSD) school and community members at the EHS Annex school gymnasium to explore options regarding the future of Exeter High School. The ERCSD Board's purpose in convening this future search was to solicit the group's input on whether the board should 1) proceed with renovations to the existing high school on Linden Street, or 2) give voters an opportunity to vote for a new high school on an alternative site at the March 2003 School District Meeting. This future search was prompted by two occurrences: the resolution of the school bond lawsuit and the unforeseen availability of a single piece of land that met pre-identified criteria for serving as a site for a new high school.

The following summary report provides an overview of the information that was presented at the future search, along with the key participant recommendations, accompanied by their concerns and suggestions for going forward.

Randy Benthien of Benthien Associates, Inc., an organizational, development and leadership consulting firm based in Goffstown, New Hampshire facilitated the gathering (as he also did for the previous two future search conferences). Following is the Benthien Associates report of the 2002 Future Search.

Recommendation to the School Board

Almost unanimously, the group voted to recommend to the ERCSD Board to bring a bond forward in March 2003 for the construction of a new high school on Old Town Farm Road.

The actual vote break down was:

- 69 in favor of building a new high school on the alternative site
- 4 opposed
- 1 abstention

Many of those present felt that an overarching reason for putting the question to the voters is that the voters deserve to have a voice in whether to stay with the plan, to renovate, or switch to building new. They agreed with the School Board that to not give the taxpayers this vote would be inappropriate. It is a big opportunity and a momentous decision. The Board was congratulated for having the courage to bring the alternative site to community discussion, rather than ignoring it, and merely proceeding as previously decided.

Reasons For Building a New School on the Alternative Site

Participants voiced many reasons for preferring to build a new high school rather than renovate the existing high school. Several of those reasons received considerable attention and support:

- An entirely new high school on a site large enough to contain it effectively was seen as a much better value than the renovation plan for Linden Street. People thought the voters would be getting a "bigger bang for their buck." They felt that the estimated costs to taxpayers of building new and renovating were fairly equal (approximately 4 cents more per \$1000 of valuation 88 cents vs. 84 cents). Several comments were made about the variable costs of a renovation project ("you never know what you're going to find as the renovations proceed and what that will do to the total project cost").
- The alternative site offers greater potential for long-term growth. Exeter's new high school for either site will be built to accommodate 2000 students. This will meet current population projections through 2012. However, given the amount of land at the alternative site (118 acres), there is far greater potential for future growth options there, than at Linden Street, where space is extremely limited (30 acres). Additionally, individuals noted that the Linden Street site falls below acreage norms for a high school this size.
- Participants believed the alternative site allows the most flexibility in achieving the best educational design. Renovations inevitably mean compromising on plans—and never getting exactly what you want—because of various structural constraints. However, building a new high school enables the community to design a facility that will best meet educational needs.
- Building at the alternative site means no disruption to teaching and learning during construction. Participants felt very strongly about this. They were deeply concerned about the impact renovating the high school would have on students and staff and the ability to learn during the course of a three-year (or longer) renovation.

Other reasons included:

- The athletic facilities would be greatly improved. The alternative site has room to build at least seven new fields and we would be able to retain the current fields at Linden Street.
- Parking at the alternative site (estimated to have 1000 parking spots) would be more than double that at Linden Street, and congestion in downtown Exeter would be eased.
- A new school on a new site would likely create a much greater sense of ownership in the school for all towns in the cooperative more than exists now.
- If the ERCSD Board proceeds with bringing a bond forward in March 2003, considerable effort needs to be given in educating voters on how we got here why building a new school is preferable

over renovating, and an explanation of the true costs (including a history of previously passed bonds). Special care needs to also be given to the wording of the warrant article, so if it does not pass, the renovation on Linden Street can go on as previously planned.

The Exeter Region Cooperative School Board appointed the following individuals to serve on the New Exeter High School Building Subcommittee. The Committee's charge was to make a recommendation to the full board on all of the details of a new high school.

At its October 8, 2002 meeting, the Exeter Region Cooperative School Board unanimously voted to accept the recommendation of the Future Search Committee to proceed with a bond article to construct a new high school.

SAU Technology

The organization of school technology plans in New Hampshire are determined by the <u>State of New Hampshire Educational Technology Plan</u>, which was developed by the Office of Educational Technology (OET), New Hampshire Department of Education. In turn, the state technology plan was approved by the United States Department of Education. All state-level school technology agencies use the national technology plan, <u>e-Learning: Putting a World Class Education at the Fingertips of All Children</u>, as a guide for development of state-level plans. School district technology plans should be approved by their respective school boards and then submitted for approval to the OET. Approval by the OET provides districts with access to state and federal grant funds and other resources.

This SAU 16 2002-2006 Technology Plan represents the first combined effort of all SAU 16 school districts to coordinate the implementation and use of technology. This planning effort began in September of 2000 with a review of the SAU 16 Mission Statement and the acceptance of the Technology Vision Statement that was prepared by Exeter Region Cooperative School District (ERCSD) in 1996. Since the implementation of the 1996 ERCSD Technology Plan, many technological advances have been implemented within SAU 16 as outlined in the table below.

The SAU #16 Joint Board, at its September 16, 2002 meeting, unanimously approved the SAU Technology Plan.

SAU Emergency Preparedness

On October 15th and 16th 2002, the SAU 16 administration along with selected staff, school board members, municipal officials, and representatives from Phillips Exeter Academy, Seabrook Station, Rockingham County Attorney's office and the Rockingham County Sheriff's office attended emergency preparedness training facilitated by the New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management. This training is an example of the ongoing effort in the SAU schools to ensure that the schools' emergency plans are coordinated with the towns' emergency management plans on behalf of all SAU 16 students and staff.

SAU Collaboration

Central administration, school administrators, and the seven school boards of SAU 16 continue to use an unprecedented collaborative approach to coordinate curriculum, technology initiatives, staff evaluation, professional development, and with other district-wide efforts, to ensure quality and consistency of educational opportunities. This is of particular importance since the six individual elementary school districts send all their sixth grade students to the Cooperative Middle School (CMS). Incoming students to CMS have the greatest opportunity for enhanced learning when their sending schools share a coordinated curriculum and assessment process. All of the SAU 16 district school boards are to be commended for their continued work with collaborative efforts.
